Instructions: Northwestern Law

To be eligible to apply for admission to the juris doctor program at Northwestern Law, you must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university or have completed the equivalent of six semesters and expect to graduate during the current academic year.

Typically, the Admissions Committee selects the 240 members of the first-year class from approximately 5,000 applicants. Decisions are based on a number of factors, including academic records, application information, letters of recommendation, standardized test results, interviews, work experience, extracurricular activities, leadership, personal circumstances, and other pertinent information.

Each state has character and fitness and other qualifications for admission to the bar. Prior to matriculation, all applicants should consult the bar admission authorities in the state in which he or she intends to practice law to determine these requirements. The APPLICATION

A completed application to Northwestern Law consists of a number of parts that are sent to the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid by the applicant and the LSAC Credential Assembly Service (CAS).

(This includes your LSAT results and previous transcripts. If you have registered with LSAC, the Credential Assembly Service Law School Report is sent electronically to us.)

- A nonrefundable \$100 application fee payable by check or money order to Northwestern University or paid electronically via credit card
- Recommended evaluative interview
- Optional essays

Application Updates

Although the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid seeks to keep you informed of the status of your application and the receipt of documents, it is your responsibility to ensure that all parts of your application are received by the deadline. Applicants can check the status of their application on our website. The web address will be e-mailed to you when we receive your application. Applicants who do not provide an e-mail address will be responsible for tracking their application through inquiries. The Admissions Committee does not review incomplete applications. Applicants will be notified of their decision electronically. Decisions will not be sent via US mail or provided over the phone.

The various parts of the completed application may be sent to the Law School before the Application for Admission form itself. Any supplementary materials submitted with the application must have your name clearly noted on each page. (In several places in the application materials, your Social Security number is requested to assist in the accurate assembly of each file. It is not mandatory to supply that number.)

How to Apply for Admission

Electronic technology is an essential and integral part of law school and the legal profession. In recognition of the importance of technology, we no longer mail a paper admission application. We require all applicants to complete their application to Northwestern Law via an electronic method. There are several options, described below. Note that there is no admissions advantage given to any of these methods.

1. You can use the LSAC Credential Assembly Service electronic application. This method is preferred as our office tries to be environmentally friendly and move towards a paperless process.
2. On our website at www.law.northwestern.edu/admissions/applying/, there is a blank PDF version of our application. If you prefer, you can print out this blank application and fill it out manually. You can also type your information directly onto this PDF form and print it out.

3. You can complete and submit your application directly on our website at www.law.northwestern.edu/admissions/applying. The web application uploads directly to the LSAC admissions database. If you prefer to print and mail your application rather than to submit it online, you can do that as well.

4. If you encounter difficulty with these electronic methods or lack access to a computer, we can fax you a paper version of the application forms. For a faxed copy, please contact the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid at 312.503.8465.

Personal Statement

The personal statement is an opportunity for you to introduce yourself to the Admissions Committee. You may discuss, among other topics, personal or professional goals and personal, academic, or career history. In addition to test scores and grade-point averages, the Committee views the personal statement as a means to look at a variety of factors in distinguishing among many capable applicants. Please do not submit revisions to your personal statement once you have submitted it. Your personal statement should be electronically attached to your Application for Admission.

Optional Essays

Although not required, the optional essays provide an opportunity for you to give the Admissions Committee additional information that you may not have been able to incorporate into your personal statement. Your optional essays may be electronically attached to your Application for Admission. Topics for the optional essays are located on the application.

Letter of Recommendation

One letter of recommendation is required as part of the admissions process. The letter should be completed by someone who can evaluate your professional work-related performance (current or former supervisor, clients or co-worker).

Please note that because only one recommendation is required, your file will become complete once we have received the first letter. The Office of Admissions will not hold your file for pending recommendations.

Credential Assembly Service Law School Report

The Credential Assembly Service Law School Report contains a summary of each applicant's academic work, copies of college transcripts, and the LSAT results. You may register with LSAC online at LSAC.org.

Northwestern Law recommends that foreign-educated applicants register with the Credential Assembly Service. If you received your undergraduate degree from an educational institution outside the US, its territories, and Canada, you are encouraged to register with Credential Assembly Service and to have your transcripts and any other required documentation sent to Credential Assembly Service for processing. The Credential Assembly Service will then forward your complete law school report to the Law School. More information on the Credential Assembly Service is available on the LSAC website at LSAC.org. If you choose not to use the Credential Assembly Service, you must have an official copy of your transcripts, in English (or a certified translation), sent directly to the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid.

You are encouraged to register with LSAC and with the Credential Assembly Service (if applicable) in early fall and should ask your college registrars to mail transcripts to LSAC as soon as those transcripts become available. (Although LSAC attempts to inform each applicant about the receipt of transcripts, the responsibility for following up remains with the applicant.)

Standardized Test

Applicants must take the LSAT for consideration. In cases where multiple scores exist, we will use your highest score when evaluating your file.

LSAT test results are sent directly to the Law School from LSAC. The Law School will accept scores up to 5 years after the test date. The LSAT is offered four times per year: February, June, September/October, and December. Applicants may register for the LSAT through the Law School Admission Council website (LSAC.org). To be sure that your application is completed on time, you should take the LSAT no later than December, though February results are accepted. Waiting for February test results may delay review of your application.

Interviews

Although not required, an evaluative personal interview with a member of the admissions staff, a student admissions counselor, or a member of our 800-person alumni interviewing network is strongly encouraged. Applicants have the option to interview on or off campus through our unique interviewing program. Last year, we interviewed more than 3,600 candidates in 40 states and 32 foreign countries.

Interviews provide the Admissions Committee with additional information about your interpersonal and communication skills, maturity, and motivation. Interviews also provide you the opportunity to learn more about the Law School.

Interviews can take place either before or after you submit an Application for Admission. You may request an interview online at www.law.northwestern.edu/admissions/applying/interview.html. It is best to make your request one month prior to the desired interview date to allow for processing time. On-campus interviews are conducted on weekdays between 9:00 AM and 4:30 PM from September through February and are usually 30 minutes long. On-campus interviews take place at the Law School during normal business hours and appointment times are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Off-campus interviews with alumni can be requested as early as August, but the deadline to request an off-campus interview is December 1. Off-campus interviews with alumni are available in most US metropolitan areas. (In our continued effort to offer an interview to all applicants, Chicago-area applicants should request a local alumni interview.) If you plan to interview off campus, please request your interview as early as possible and no later than December 1, as a limited number of interviews are available at each location. Typically, after you request an alumni interview, we will provide you the contact information of your alumni interviewer through the Off-Campus Interviewing Portal. Please allow approximately three weeks to receive the contact information.

All off-campus interview requests must come through the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid. We attempt to assign applicants to interviewers within a 100-mile radius of their requested location. Regardless of whom you interview with (staff, student, or alumnus), all interviews are given the same weight and consideration in the admission review process.

The Admissions Committee invites some applicants to interview if more information is needed before making a decision.

Applicants cannot have more than one interview during the same admissions cycle, and Northwestern Law does not conduct phone interviews as part of the admissions process. It is the applicant's responsibility to sign-up for an interview online on our website; the Admissions Committee will not contact you to schedule an interview.

Application Filing Period

Applications for Admission are accepted at the law school from September 1 to February 15 and are reviewed on a rolling basis beginning in late November. The Law School may exclude from consideration any application submitted after February 15 or any application that is incomplete at that date. Applications received after February 15 may not receive a decision until mid-June. Applications are considered only for the current year and for full-time registration. There is no evening program or mid-year entry. Applicants should complete the application process as early as possible. An early application often yields an early decision.

The Admissions Committee begins review of completed applications in late November. Applicants whose supporting materials are received by the February 15 deadline are notified of final decisions by the end of May.

Early Decision Program

Applicants who have thoroughly researched their law school options and who have identified Northwestern as their first choice law school may wish to apply for Early Decision. Northwestern's Early Decision program is binding. If admitted through the Early Decision program, you must commit to matriculating at Northwestern and submit a nonrefundable \$750 seat deposit by the date indicated on your letter of admission. You also must withdraw all of your applications to other schools and refrain from initiating any new applications if and when you are notified of your acceptance through the Early Decision program. You may not be an Early Decision candidate at more than one law school.

To be considered for Early Decision, your application must be complete, including your Credential Assembly Service Law School Report, by December 1. (Accordingly, in order to make sure your application is complete by the December 1 deadline, it would be in your best interest to submit your application by November 15 if you are applying through LSAC.) The September LSAT administration is the last acceptable score for consideration as an Early Decision candidate.

An on-campus interview is mandatory for Early Decision candidates. Off-campus interviews are not accepted. Your interview must be completed by November 15 to be considered for Early Decision. You are encouraged to sign-up for your interview as soon as possible to ensure that there are appointments available, as all on-campus interview appointment slots are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

You must sign and return the Early Decision Certification (Supplemental Application) with your Application for Admission directly to the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid. Your Early Decision Certification will not be transmitted by Credential Assembly Service. You will be notified of the Admissions Committee's decision by the end of December.

Reapplicants

If you are reapplying to the Law School, you must submit a complete application. Although previous applications are kept for two years, the Admissions Committee requires that reapplicants submit a full application, including an updated personal statement, in order to adequately present information that has changed since the original application.

Foreign-Educated Applicants

Applicants with undergraduate degrees from institutions outside the United States are required to take the Law School Admission Test and are encouraged to register for the LSAC Credential Assembly Service (see page 3). Northwestern Law recommends that foreign-educated applicants send their transcripts, along with any other required documentation, directly to the Credential Assembly Service for inclusion in the Credential Assembly Service Law School Report. If not using the Credential Assembly Service, foreign-educated applicants must provide a copy of their transcripts, in English (or a certified translation), directly to the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid. A Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is not required.

Visiting Students

Students currently enrolled in other Association of American Law Schools' member schools may be admitted to Northwestern as visiting students for a single term or an academic year. To be considered, you must submit a visiting student application (downloadable from www.law.northwestern.edu/admissions), furnish a transcript and letter of good standing from the law school in which you are a candidate for a degree, and provide recommendations from two law school faculty members and any other information required by Northwestern Law. Visiting students are not considered as candidates for degrees from Northwestern.

The deadline to apply to visit during the spring semester is November 15. The deadline to apply to visit during the fall semester or the entire academic year is August 1.

Transfer Applicants

If you are submitting a transfer application, you follow the same basic procedure as the applicant for initial entry. In addition, you must supply the Office of Admissions and Financial Aid with:

- A final undergraduate transcript
- A letter from the law school already attended attesting to your good standing
- A complete transcript of the first year's work, including class rank, if available
- A writing sample from the first year's work (in addition to the required personal statement)
- A copy of your Credential Assembly Service Law School Report
- One letter of recommendation from a law professor who has taught you
- The nonrefundable transfer application fee of \$100, payable online with a credit card or by check or money order to Northwestern University.

To be considered as a transfer student, you must have earned approximately 28 semester hours (or the equivalent) of credit at an ABA-accredited law school and intend to complete your last two years of residence at Northwestern.

Transfer applications should be submitted no earlier than June 1 and must be completed no later than July 1. The Admissions Committee attempts to make decisions on transfer applications by late July. An excellent first-year law school performance is essential for favorable consideration.

The joint JD-MBA program does not accept transfer students.

Transfer Credit

Only applicants from law schools accredited by the American Bar Association will qualify for transfer consideration. Transfer students must complete their last two years of residence at Northwestern; grades below a C or its equivalent will not be accepted for transfer credit. The amount of credit an accepted applicant will receive at Northwestern for completed first-year work usually will not exceed 28 semester units (48 quarter units). Please note that because of the differences in curriculum among law schools, students who are admitted on a transfer basis may not receive full credit for courses taken at the law schools from which they are transferring. The granting of such credit is at the discretion of Northwestern Law.

JD-MBA Program

A combined JD-MBA program is offered by the Law School and Northwestern's Kellogg Graduate School of Management. The joint program enables you to complete both degrees in three years instead of five. All applicants must submit a single online application that mirrors the Kellogg School application. Please refer to the Kellogg School's admissions application for deadlines. An evaluative interview must be arranged with a member of a Kellogg's admissions staff or Kellogg alumni representative. Evaluation of all applications will be performed jointly by the admissions staffs at Kellogg and the Law School.

Both degrees are conferred upon completion of 16 managerial courses, including all core courses, and a minimum of 72 semester hours of Law School course work.

JD-PhD Program

A combined juris doctor-doctor of philosophy program is offered by the Law School and Northwestern's Graduate School. The JD-PhD program allows students to earn a law degree and a doctorate in one of the social sciences (such as sociology, political science, psychology, or economics) in approximately six years. All applicants submit a single, online application and must take both the LSAT and the Graduate Record Examination (GRE). The primary objective of this program is to produce scholars who have the skills necessary to do basic and applied research in legal systems. Graduates to this program qualify for admission to the bar. They also are trained in both the theory and methods of social science and in field research on legal systems.

FINANCIAL AID CHECKLIST

A completed financial aid application to Northwestern Law consists of:

- A 2012-2013 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- An online 2012-2013 Need Access Application (www.needaccess.org)
- Supplemental Scholarship and Grant Application (available only to admitted students on the admitted student website)

These items are required to be considered for federal and/or private educational loan programs as well as scholarships and grants.

Financial Aid Overview

Northwestern offers a comprehensive financial aid program for students needing assistance. The program of grants and loans is designed to enable any accepted student to attend the law school, regardless of financial need. The school annually awards \$3.5 million in grants and scholarships. Please consult www.law.northwestern.edu/admissions/tuitionaid for program-specific instructions.

Applying for financial aid is separate from the admissions process, and the information disclosed in the Need Access application has no bearing on the admissions evaluation process or decisions.

To receive full consideration for grant and scholarship assistance, you must complete and file a 2012-2013 Need Access application by March 1. The Need Access application can be completed online at www.needaccess.org after January 1, 2012. Additional applications will be necessary after admission.

Financial Aid for International Students

If you are an international student, you do not have to file a FAFSA. International students are not eligible to receive federal

loans. However, you may be eligible for institutional grants and private educational loans.

For private educational loan consideration, please submit:

- A completed 2012-2013 Need Access application. It can be completed online at www.needaccess.org after January 2, 2012. If tax information is not available when completing the Need Access application, estimates are acceptable.
- A signed copy of your 2011 foreign tax return or a notarized document verifying your 2011 income.

Please include the conversion rate of foreign currency into US dollars. Tax returns in a foreign language must be accompanied by a certified translation.

Grants and Scholarships

The law school administers an extensive program of grants and scholarships that are available through endowed funds, gifts from alumni, and an appropriation of general funds from the university. These are awarded based on a combination of merit- and need-based factors. To receive full consideration for grant and scholarship assistance, you must complete and file all required financial aid application documents by March 1, 2012. Additional applications will be necessary after admission and will be available on our admitted student website.

Because grants and scholarship funds are limited, please note that we are not able to give grant and scholarship awards to all admitted applicants who apply for grants and scholarships by the March 1 deadline. Therefore, it is best to apply for financial aid well in advance of the March deadline to increase the likelihood of institutional funding being available.

Loans

Students at the law school have a number of federal, institutional, and private educational loans available to them. All students are eligible to participate in university programs, provided that cosigner requirements are met. To participate in federal loan programs, you must be either a US citizen or a permanent resident.
