



A Decade of Righting Wrongs

The Center on Wrongful Convictions celebrates 10 years of making a difference in the lives of those unjustly incarcerated

In 2002, Julie Rea Harper was convicted of killing her ten-year-old son in a brutal stabbing committed on October 13, 1997. She was sentenced to 65 years in prison.

Harper insisted on her innocence, saying that an intruder had broken into her Lawrenceville, Illinois, home, stabbed her son, and then attacked her. She had injuries consistent with her account. Two years later, a serial killer on death row claimed he had committed the crime.

Coverage of the story caught the eye of **Judy Royal JD '81**, a volunteer attorney with Northwestern Law's Center on Wrongful Convictions (CWC). She successfully advocated for the CWC to take the case on behalf of Harper.

For the next two years, Royal and attorneys from the CWC and Schiff Hardin LLP prepared for the trial, which began in July 2006. Harper was acquitted on July 26, 2006. She had spent approximately two years in a maximum security prison for a crime she did not commit.

"It's hard to describe what it's like working on a case like this," says Royal. "The other attorneys were so inspiring to work with and Julie Rea Harper was clearly innocent and had been through a terrible ordeal."

The Harper case is just one example of the extraordinary and invaluable work done daily by the staff and volunteers of the CWC, which celebrates 10 years of advocating for the wrongfully convicted this year. An anniversary celebration was held on November 14, 2008, and included a reception and a production of *The Exonerated*, an award-winning play based on the real-life stories of innocent people sent to death row.

Landmark Event

The CWC was founded by current Executive Director Rob Warden and former Northwestern Law Professor **Larry Marshall JD '85** following the landmark "National Conference on Wrongful Convictions and the Death Penalty" in November 1998.

The conference featured 28 former prisoners from around the country who had been sentenced to death for crimes they did not commit. International coverage of the conference

brought attention to the issue of wrongful convictions, especially in capital offenses.

Just months after, prisoner Anthony Porter, convicted of murder on false testimony from a purported eyewitness, was exonerated. A legal team including Marshall and clinic students won a reprieve from the Illinois Supreme Court only two days before Porter was scheduled to die. Investigative journalism students from Northwestern's Medill School subsequently established Porter's innocence.

With attention so focused on the innocence issue, the CWC was able to launch with private funding. It was the third such center affiliated with a law school and the first to accept non-DNA as well as DNA cases.

Far-reaching Accomplishments

Since its inception, the CWC has accumulated a number of far-reaching accomplishments.

Staff and volunteers have been key in the exonerations of 19 men and women convicted of murders or other serious crimes they didn't commit. The CWC was a major driving force behind both the moratorium on executions in Illinois declared by former Governor George Ryan in 2000 and Ryan's decision to commute all Illinois death sentences in 2003. CWC research on factors leading to wrongful convictions informed comprehensive criminal justice reforms approved by the Illinois General Assembly in 2003.

The CWC's impact has reached beyond the state's borders, too. It was a charter member of the Innocence Network, a group of now nearly 50 similar projects in the United States and around the world. It has been involved in cases from other states and has been amicus curiae in various state and U.S. Supreme Court cases, and even one in Japan.

"During our 10 years, CWC staff and attorneys have not only been involved in many exonerations, but have also raised the salience of the issue of innocence in the death

penalty debate and have made Illinois a beacon of reform among states," says CWC Legal Director **Steve Drizin JD '86**.

Students Play Critical Role

Law students have played a critical role in the CWC since its beginning. There have been students for whom the CWC was the deciding factor in choosing Northwestern Law.

Jonah Horwitz JD '10, who worked as a CWC intern before starting law school, not only turned down higher-ranked schools, but also said that his experience at the CWC is what motivated him to go to law school.

After spending a summer writing summaries of wrongful convictions for the CWC's database, Horwitz made what he characterized as a surprising choice for a liberal: to become a prosecutor.

"One morning it occurred to me that being a prosecutor and doing my best to avoid these kinds of tragic cases would be a way to do my small part to improve a seriously flawed criminal justice system," he says.

Alumna **Stephanie Horten JD '04** worked at the CWC while she was a student and continued working pro bono on the Harper case after graduation, even reducing her work schedule to be able to do so.

"It was impossible to know about the Harper case and not want to do everything you possibly could to help," says Horten, who worked at Sonnenschein, Nath and Rosenthal then and now is with the Illinois appellate defender's office. "And I just wanted to be around the CWC attorneys and felt honored that they let me. They represent the kind of attorney that we should all aspire to be: unbelievably dedicated, compassionate, and unrelenting in their fight for justice."

Horten is among the alumni who continue to support the CWC financially.

“I will always support it in absolutely any way I can so every law student might have the same experience I had working with such amazing attorneys and fighting for something bigger than oneself,” she says.

In the Headlines

Cases in which the CWC is involved continue to keep the issue of wrongful convictions in the headlines. Among them was that of Michael Evans and Paul Terry, convicted for allegedly committing a double murder when they were 17. They languished in prison until their 40s, when DNA evidence proved their innocence.

Many of the CWC’s biggest victories, however, were achieved without the benefit of DNA evidence. A false confession and an erroneous identification by the victim put Robert Wilson in prison for nearly a decade before CWC attorneys Jane Raley and Karen Daniel procured his freedom.

Most recently, CWC attorneys Jeff Urdangen and Karen Daniel persuaded the Illinois Supreme Court to reverse the murder conviction of Alan Beaman, who had been imprisoned for 13 years. He is awaiting retrial.

The importance of exonerations, and of the publicity they generate, goes beyond the individuals whose freedom is restored, as incalculable as that is.

“Exonerations drive the effort for systemic reform,” says Warden. “There are so many cases, and exoneration can take years even once you can show clear innocence, so the best we can do is reform the system so that this horrible outcome doesn’t befall so many.”

Reform is becoming more urgent, Warden says, because the era of DNA-based exonerations after conviction is drawing to a close now that DNA tests are routinely conducted before trial. When DNA-based exonerations leave the front pages, the issue of innocence may recede in the public’s mind.

“We’ve had extreme success in Illinois, but we need to go a lot further,” Warden says. “Reforms are needed in areas including eyewitnesses, police interrogations, jailhouse snitches, police ethics, and prosecutors, and that’s where we’ll be moving in the next 10 years.”

Identifying the Problem

To fix the criminal justice process, reformers need to identify the causes of systemic problems. The CWC’s research role is thus as important as its work in defending innocent people. After Governor Ryan’s moratorium on executions, for example, the CWC’s research was used by the Illinois General Assembly in writing its 2003 criminal justice reform package.

The CWC’s research has been cited by attorneys, academics, courts, and state commissions studying the causes of wrongful convictions. “The Problem of False Confessions in the Post-DNA World,” Drizin’s 2004 article with Richard Leo, documents 125 proven false confessions, the largest such data set. Warden’s “The Snitch System” has become the leading study on witnesses who made deals with the prosecution to falsely testify against others. The CWC also published Thomas Sullivan’s “Police Experiences with Electronic Recording of Interrogations,” the first look at police departments’ (overwhelmingly favorable) views on that issue. Warden and Drizin are currently editing a book on false confessions that will be released in 2009.

In addition to research publications, the CWC sponsors forums to raise public awareness and to foster reforms. The most recent forum, in February 2008, highlighted the plight of exonerated clients who have been waiting years for “automatic” compensation under Illinois law. It spurred the Illinois legislature to enact new procedures. The CWC also has sponsored events off campus,

including ones in Texas and Michigan, to highlight the problem of eyewitness fallibility, the leading cause of wrongful convictions, and one in Ohio on false confessions, which helped persuade the governor to commute a death sentence.

Rising Costs

CWC attorneys currently represent 26 clients whose defense on average costs about \$46,000 a year. The annual budget of more than \$1 million is small for what’s been accomplished, Warden says.

“Contributions are money well spent,” he says.

About half of the budget is provided by the Law School, a small fraction comes from endowments and foundation grants, and the rest from annual direct mail appeals and fundraising events.

The CWC expects that its costs will increase as it takes on more non-DNA cases in the future.

“The costs of investigators and experts in non-DNA cases, which often require lengthy contested hearings and trials, outstrip those in DNA cases,” Drizin says. “I would say to our donors to think of the CWC as a Chicago institution with a national, if not worldwide, reputation – an institution that donors should support, just like they do the Chicago Symphony and the Field Museum, so that we can continue to be a beacon of justice.”

Every month the CWC receives about 200 requests for representation. At the current staffing level, it can accept only about half of 1 percent of those.

“There is no question that a significant number of the cases that must be rejected for lack of resources have genuine merit,” Warden says. “Having to say no to scores of men and women in desperate need is the hardest part of what we do.”

Plan 2008: Preparing Great Leaders for the Changing World

Northwestern Law's newest initiative proposes innovative additions to traditional legal education

Northwestern Law recently completed one of the most comprehensive reviews of the legal market ever conducted by a law school. The two-year study culminated in a 23-page report, "Plan 2008: Preparing Great Leaders for the Changing World," which outlines the review's findings and offers recommendations on how to maximize the long-term success of the school's graduates.

Alumni, faculty, administrators, and students all had a hand in developing the Plan. Representatives from each section of the Law School's community formed

a Working Group that oversaw the initiative. Managing partners, general counsel, and other leaders of top law firms, corporations, government offices and nonprofits shared their perspectives in focus groups that took place in the United States and London.

The aim of the Plan was to establish an understanding of the core competencies that employers say students need to succeed in an ever-changing legal profession and to propose ways of introducing those competencies into the school's academic program, says **Terri Mascherin JD '84**, co-chair of the Working Group and a partner with Jenner & Block LLP.

"The motivating goal of the process was to determine whether there were ways we could adjust the curriculum or our methods of teaching and delivery of content to better prepare graduates not only for their first job after law school, but for their entire career, which could take many twists and turns," she says.

One of the most striking findings to arise from the process was the universal desire for more business-related skills, Mascherin says.

"The most surprising thing to me was the response to the reforms we were considering regarding quantitative analysis and strategic business thinking — skills we usually relate more with business school than with

became the first top-tier law school to offer an accelerated, two-year JD program.

The school plans to enroll a small number of highly-motivated individuals into the program. It welcomes the first group of Accelerated JD students in May 2009. Students in the program will take the same number of credits as students in the traditional,

three-year program, but in a condensed time frame — five semesters instead of six. As with traditional JD students, Accelerated JD students can

participate in all extra curricular and co-curricular activities, including journals, and all campus recruitment activities, including fall on-campus interviewing.

The Plan proposes that two new courses and one existing course be required for both the AJD and, eventually, the three-year candidates. The two new courses cover quantitative analysis (accounting, finance, and statistics) and the dynamics of legal services behavior (social networks, teamwork, leadership, and project management); the other course focuses on strategic decision-making (improving students' ability to understand the strategies pursued by their clients and organizations).

Development and implementation of the AJD program provides the school with one of the first opportunities to shape a curriculum influenced by Plan 2008's recommendations, says Professor Stephen Presser, who co-chaired the Working Group with Mascherin.



law school," she says. "Coming from a law firm background where you have to learn these skills on the job, I felt like we needed to give students a grounding in this type of information. I was surprised that across the board our external focus groups agreed that this would be valuable."

In addition to quantitative skills and strategic business thinking, the Working Group determined that the core competencies employers desire include communication, teamwork, cross-cultural work, project management, and leadership skills.

The Accelerated JD

The announcement of the Plan and the first major initiative to launch from its recommendations, the Accelerated JD (AJD), garnered extensive media attention from major national newspapers, law publications, and industry bloggers. With the announcement, Northwestern Law

“The AJD is really the crown jewel of the whole enterprise,” he says. “The program requires courses that will give students the ability to hit the ground running for their employers, whatever the industry, and provides an experimental opportunity to implement what we’ve learned from the development of Plan 2008.”

The school has assigned a number of task forces to finalize details of other Plan 2008 recommendations.

Proof in the Pudding

Reaction to Plan 2008 and the AJD program has overwhelmingly been positive, say members of the Working Group.

“The individuals I’ve spoken with seem impressed by the bold steps we’re taking to teach non-traditional legal skills which are critical to success in legal services,” says Professor James Lupo, a Working Group member.

Though, as with any proposed reform, there are a few skeptics.

“Some probably see teaching students business skills as getting too close to the practical and too far away from ethics and philosophy, but there’s value in recognizing that most legal professionals work in a business environment and require business skills,” Presser says.

While debate over the direction of legal education will always remain under heated discussion, time can determine the accuracy and value of Plan 2008’s findings and recommendations, Mascherin says.

“The proof will be in the pudding in terms of the quality of graduates we put out,” she says.
