Viet D. Dinh is a Professor of Law and the Deputy Director of the Asian Law and Policy Studies Program at Georgetown University Law Center.

He was Associate Special Counsel to the U.S. Senate

Banking Committee for the Whitewater investigation and Special Counsel to U.S. Senator Pete V. Domenici for the impeachment trial of President Clinton. He also serves as counsel to the Special Master mediating a number of lawsuits by Holocaust victims against German and Austrian financial institutions. Most recently, Professor Dinh served as Assistant Attorney General, Office of Legal Policy, U.S. Department of Justice where he played an integral part in developing the USA Patriot Act.

His representative publications include "Reassessing the Law of Preemption" in the *Georgetown Law Journal* (2000), "What Is the Law in Law and Development?" in the *Green Bag* (1999), "Codetermination and Corporate Governance in a Multinational Business Enterprise" in the *Journal of Corporation Law* (1999), and "Races, Crime, and the Law" in the *Harvard Law Review* (1998).

Professor Dinh was born in Saigon, Vietnam and came to America as a refugee in 1978. He graduated magna cum laude from both Harvard College and Harvard Law School, where he was a Class Marshal and an Olin Research Fellow in Law and Economics. Professor Dinh served as a law clerk to Judge Laurence H. Silberman of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit and to U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor.
